

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# **Rose Care**

In early May, I put one (1) tablespoon of Osmocote around each bush, which will last for several weeks.

You will need to start fertilizing every two weeks. Water thoroughly before fertilizing, if it does not rain, water between fertilizing. DO NOT WATER AT NIGHT. The best time to water is in the morning hours so foliage will dry before nightfall, because roses do not like to go to bed with wet feet. Do not fertilize after August.

Also, it is time to begin your spray program of an insecticide, such as Isotox, and a fungicide, such as Funginex. NOTE: Be sure to follow directions on labels.

At the first sight of disease, spray with a fungicide every 10 days during the growing season.

At first sight of insects, spray with an insecticide, and then repeat application in 10 days. If needed, you can spray every 10 days.

When the buds have been spent, prune back to first 5<sup>th</sup> leaf. Roses that are kept neatly pruned will consistently produce more flowers than bushes not pruned. After the first buds have been removed, remove most of the foliage at the lower end of the plant (about three (3) or four (4) leaves up from the ground) to improve air circulation. In Mid-September, discontinue pruning buds to allow bushes to store energy for the winter.

At Thanksgiving, it is time to prune a few inches of dense, twigging top growth from bushes to prevent winter wind damage. If the weather is mild, spray a fungicide on bare stems and on the ground. Begin mulching to protect from winter cold.



# MENTAL HEALTH AWARENESS

All humans have brains, so everyone is susceptible to having a mental illness at some point in life. Being aware of what signs and symptoms are and what to do if you start to recognize those signs in yourself or someone you know, can make a big difference in getting help and feeling better.

Everyone goes through things in life that can affect mental health — stress from a job, the loss of a loved one, or life changes like having a baby or getting divorced. All of these things and more can cause us to feel and act differently for a short period of time. A mental health concern becomes a problem when the symptoms make it difficult to do daily tasks or you feel unlike yourself for more than 4 weeks.


### Common signs of mental illness include:

- Feeling sad or down
- Confused thinking or reduced ability to concentrate
- Excessive fears or worries, or extreme feelings of guilt
- Extreme mood changes of highs and lows
- Withdrawal from friends and activities
- Significant tiredness, low energy, or problems sleeping
- Detachment from reality (delusions), paranoia, or hallucinations
- Inability to cope with daily problems or stress
- Trouble understanding and relating to situations and to people
- Problems with alcohol or drug use
- · Major changes in eating habits
- Excessive anger, hostility, or violence
- Suicidal thinking

Sometimes signs of mental illness are also physical problems, like ongoing stomach pain, back pain, headaches, or other unexplained aches and pains along with other signs listed above.

Most mental illnesses do not get better on their own. If untreated, they might get worse over time and cause serious problems. You can use the list above to talk to your doctor or other health-care provider about how you are feeling and the many options available for treatment.

If someone you know shows signs of mental distress, talk openly with them about your concerns. You cannot force someone to get professional



care, but you can offer encouragement and support. You can also help your loved one find a qualified mental health professional and make an appointment. You could even offer to take them or go along to the appointment if they would like.

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# Pre- and Post-emergence Strike of Slugs & Snails on Soybeans

# Abundance of Slugs & Snails in 2024

The warmer winter in 2024, along with rains and foggy conditions during several days in March and April, have been conducive to the presence of slugs and snails in commercial and research plots in Western Kentucky. Since the end of March and the first week of April, UK entomologists have been observing slugs in various stages of development, including eggs in soybean and corn fields. The favorable conditions described above might have increased their populations in fields, leading to a reduction of plant stands in several soybean fields; in many cases, entire fields have been consumed.





Figure 3. Corn stalk left in the field with brace roots that sheltered snails and their eggs. Although only 2 eggs are shown in this image, more than 15 snail eggs were found under the brace roots (Photo: Raul. Villanueva, UK).

In soybean fields heavily affected by slugs, plant stands of 2 to 10 plants per 5-ft row are in contrast to normal stands of 20 to 30 plants per 5-ft row (based on average plantings in Kentucky: 5 to 6 seeds per foot-row planted in 20" row width) (Figure 1). Damage observed in fields showed that slugs were feeding on unsprouted seeds and emerging seedlings (Figure 2). Also, observations since the first week of April have shown that eggs were laid in moist soils covered by organic matter from the previous crop (soybeans, corn, or wheat). Figure 3 shows that slugs were well protected under dry brace roots of corn, ovipositing eggs under these structures.

# Mollusk Management

There is no rescue treatment for slug damage or thresholds for application of molluscicides. If stands are low, replanting is recommended, and an application of molluscicides may be necessary. On February 27, 2024, we wrote a KPN article (<u>Slugs are Active in February 2024</u>, but Farmers Have Two Registered Molluscicides under Section 24(c) in Kentucky) that discussed the possibility of abundant mollusks during corn and soybean germination periods. This was based on environmental conditions and mentioned two metaldehyde molluscicides that are registered under the Section 24(c) for soybeans and corn in Kentucky: Deadline® M-Ps™ and Slug-Fest®. In addition to these two products, Table 1 shows additional molluscicides that can be used in corn and soybeans for management of slugs or snails.
